



WYOMING'S MEDICAL SCHOOL

The WWAMI program is Wyoming's medical school. The program is a partnership between the University of Washington, the University of Wyoming, the Wyoming Medical Society, and Wyoming hospitals and physicians. WWAMI involves the states of Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana, and Idaho.

In 1997, Wyoming began its affiliation with the University of Washington School of Medicine and 10 Wyoming medical students began their medical education. The exceptional success of the Wyoming WWAMI Program led the Wyoming Legislature to increase the class size to 20 students beginning in 2011.

WWAMI emphasizes rural healthcare and the return of Wyoming WWAMI graduates to the practice of medicine in Wyoming. As of September 2025, 463 Wyoming students have entered the WWAMI program. 83 Wyoming students are currently enrolled in the MD program at the UWSOM. 284 students have finished residency training, and 172 of the 284 (60.6%) have returned to Wyoming to practice medicine.

Wyoming medical students spend the first 18 months of medical school at The University of Wyoming in Laramie for their Foundations curriculum. They then travel throughout the WWAMI region for their clinical training. The Wyoming WWAMI program provides many opportunities for medical students to train in clinics and hospitals across Wyoming, and in 2025, 186 Wyoming physicians have WWAMI faculty appointments and teach medical students.

Now in its 29th year, WWAMI is Wyoming's medical school. We train future physicians from Wyoming, in Wyoming, for Wyoming.

Admissions Committee

The Wyoming WWAMI Admissions Committee consists of four Wyoming Physicians who volunteer their time to review all applications for the Wyoming WWAMI Program. They then participate in group interviews of selected applicants. These interviews take place virtually in February. Each spring, graduating Wyoming WWAMI medical students join their peers from medical schools across the country in learning where they “matched” and will be spending the next three to seven years in U.S. medical residency training programs.

Following their residency training and potentially a medical fellowship, these future physicians will be eligible to return and practice medicine in Wyoming, generally as board-certified physicians in their specialty noted.

In addition to learning foundational science as it applies to medicine (i.e. integrated science), students are taught foundations of clinical medicine. Foundational clinical skills are taught in four small groups – each with five medical students that are mentored by a physician (i.e. college faculty member) and a hospitalist that teaches clinical skills at the bedside. Students meet with their college faculty mentor on odd weeks and with their hospitalist on even weeks. The mentoring that these physicians provide for our students is expected to continue through the entire four years of medical school.

RUOP

Several WWAMI students participate in RUOP (Rural Underserved Opportunities Program), where they spend four weeks working with rural physicians in the summer following their first year of medical school. The purpose of the program is to encourage medical practice in rural communities by providing students with hands-on experience in clinical practice and intimate exposure to a rural community. Students also have the opportunity to discover how patients receive health care away from the highly specialized resources of the academic medical center in Seattle.

TRUST in Wyoming

The Wyoming WWAMI program participates in TRUST (Targeted Rural Underserved Track), which is a program that encourages students interested in working in rural and underserved communities in the WWAMI region. All WWAMI states participate in the TRUST program. Three students from the E-25 class are participating as scholars in the TRUST program: **Cherol Minton** in Thermopolis, **Carlos Garcia** in Fremont County, and **Daniel Shumway** in Powell. The Wyoming WWAMI program will currently accept up to four students into the program every year.

WRITE 2.0

WRITE (WWAMI Rural Integrated Training Experience) is a unique program that promotes and emphasizes rural healthcare to medical students in their third year of medical education. The WRITE program is currently allotted 40 slots for students throughout WWAMI, and is intimately linked to the Targeted Rural Underserved Track (TRUST) program.

WRITE initiated some changes beginning in the 2023-24 Academic Year. Students spend 2 academic quarters at their WRITE site (24 weeks at sites with an OB/GYN clerkship and 21 weeks for those without). The students are also assessed a single clerkship grade for WRITE (MEDLIC) for each quarter, so no more evaluations for each individual clerkship.

WRITE utilizes competency-based assessments, using Entrustable Professional Activities (EPAs) as a guide. Ultimately, we are confident using competency-based EPA assessments is more objective and simplifies the evaluation process. By the end of the WRITE experience, the students are very knowledgeable about the practice of medicine in a rural environment.

Wyoming's WRITE/TRUST Sites are located in Powell, Douglas, Fremont County, and Thermopolis. These communities have dedicated physicians and other healthcare professionals who are committed to training future rural primary care physicians.



Wyoming Rural Clinical Experience

This clinical program for all third-year WWAMI students brings them to Wyoming when they do their third-year clinical rotations. This program is available for up to six students per year. Students may come from any of the WWAMI states, and they qualify for the program if they do five or more of their six required third-year clerkships in Wyoming. The Wyoming Regional Clinical Dean's Office makes final selection, and students participating in the program receive preference for their required clerkships. This program will promote the practice of medicine in rural Wyoming and increase the number of physicians in our state.
